

# Who's Who in the Pew?

#### Tell us about yourself:

I was born April 1<sup>st</sup>, 1959 to Elsie (Kosola) and Richard Rutter. My mother's parents were quite the gypsies – Elsie had been in 17 schools. My father studied engineering and also served in the Army. He was assigned to Intel during the Korean Conflict (the only one in his platoon that could type!)



We lived in two locations in Silica, MN. The first was a lake property with an extremely tiny trailer home for our residence, then later, closer toward Hibbing. My two older sisters Desiree and Charlene and I attended a one-room school house in the country until, for me, the 4<sup>th</sup> grade, we were bussed into town. Two younger brothers, Todd & Shaun, missed that opportunity.

My father had a logging business that included both pulp wood and pine / lumber. By age 17, I was fluent in chainsaw, skidder, & Peterbilt. We were one of the first in the nation to start "chipping" wood when chipboard was augmenting plywood as a building material. I graduated from Hibbing High School in 1977, in a class of 400+ students, and have maintained close friendships from those days. (Basketball pro Kevin McHale was a year ahead of me.)

With a busy business, participation at school was not encouraged, although I spent a year on the diving team and participated in school musicals. There was frequent work after school & summers due to the logging. Martial arts held my interest; training judo, then several karate styles before moving towards kung fu and tai chi later in life. It was not uncommon to stay after school for any activities, attend judo at 7:00 PM in the high school gym, then hitchhike home. Fortunately, I sold several friends on training with me – and managed rides with their parents or simply slept over at their homes. At 17, I purchased a somewhat reliable '64 MG Midget, and my love affair with sports cars began. A year later, it was a '74 Firebird that matched the bronze "Rockford Files" model!

# How long have you attended FPC? Before that, where have you attended?

I became a member of FPC during Pastor Reiter's time. When young, church life was sporadic, although during grade school there was regular attendance plus summer bible school at the Presbyterian Church in Hibbing. Eldest sister Dee saw to it, once she had a driver's license and the keys to the Family Truckster (our big AMC wagon), that some of us made it to church! (I did not get confirmed until age 21 or so – at a Lutheran church! I also attended a Lutheran church while living in Phoenix during the mid-'80s.) I had latched onto some Taoist & Buddhist beliefs from martial arts (I read every book I could), and my father's religious interests ran toward everything from ESP to New Age. While that area had been an avenue of study for me as well, I turn toward Christianity as a "shiny, new car with a full warranty," rather than some cobbled together beliefs!

Gail Aalderks, the most loving person I've ever met, and I have been married since 1988, a year after I moved to St. Cloud. I was married previously, and have a daughter, Christina, in White Bear Lake. She and her husband Jeremy have blessed us with two granddaughters, Jacquelyn (15) and Charlotte (13). Gail and I have two adult children. Erika, 33 (a 2 lb pree-mie!), has a degree in medical coding and enjoys roller derby. Ian, 29, works for Coordinated Business Systems as a field service tech, and enjoys gaming nights with friends

#### Where's the most interesting place you've been?


China! I did not attend college but worked as a sales & service rep in Minnesota, Michigan, and Arizona. Once I moved to St. Cloud, it was a variety of driving jobs, but I really focused on martial arts. (This is with thanks to Gail's steady work history!) Having been mentored by Ted Wong - Bruce Lee's last private student, I shared the art across China, making 3 trips from 2009-2011. In this past year, I've knocked two items off the "Bucket List;" snorkeling the Florida Keys, and driving the NY-LA Cannonball route (2866 miles) in my Miata roadster. Now a Deacon, I look forward to forming deeper friendships with the congregation, and enjoy helping with the NAPS program.

#### NAPS Ministry (Nutrition Assistance Program for Seniors)

On the second Monday of every month, several volunteers gather at First Presbyterian Church for NAPS. No, they don't take a nap, they help distribute food for the Nutritional Assistance Program for Seniors (NAPS) through Second Harvest Heartland, which is the same organization that does the Feeding Area Children Together (FACT) distribution.



First Presbyterian Church started hosting the program in September of 2019, as a Mission Committee project. Karen Ondracek is the Site Coordinator for NAPS Distribution at First Presbyterian, and her husband Don Ondracek provides the muscle, along with current volunteers Mark Scholer and Connie Sandmann, Audrey Taatjes, Michael Rutter and Gail Aalderks.

On pick up day, food pick up hours are from 11:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. Shortly before this happens, the food boxes are delivered by a Second Harvest Heartland semi truck.

One thing unique to our First Presbyterian Church location, and greatly appreciated by the guests who use the program, is the drive-up feature. Recipients do not need to leave their car at all to receive their food. They drive up to the 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue entrance, where they see stacks of food boxes and friendly volunteers who load the food into the vehicle where the recipient specifies (front seat, back seat, hatch, etc).

Each food box contains about 45 pounds of non-perishables such as dry potatoes, rice, pasta, canned fruit, canned vegetables, canned tuna, canned chicken, various sauces, and dry cereal. Also, recipients can choose if they want a two pound brick of Bongaard's cheese. In the summer, recipients are given ten \$5.00 coupons for use in August and September at area Farmer's Markets.

Many of the commodities are donated by companies such as Cargill and General Mills through the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In a typical month, about 60-65 food boxes are given out at First Presbyterian Church.

There are age and income limits to qualify for NAPS. Recipients must be age 60 or older, and have a monthly gross income of \$1,632 or lower per person.

Anyone interested in being certified for the program can call Second Harvest Heartland at 1-800-362-0270. You need to call by month end to ensure you get a Page 9

box the next month. Karen Ondracek can also certify anyone interested in the program. Once qualified, the certification is good for 3 years. The recipient receives a NAPS card, which they present each month when they receive their food box.

A side benefit of this particular form of mission is being able to interact with the thankful recipients, those people in need that really appreciate the true benefits of such a program.
