Pastor's Reflections

I was asked recently why I don't preach on elections and those who are seeking elected office. I responded, "I try to preach the biblical text." Sometimes, the Bible leads us to hot-button issues and the challenges of our day. But, often when elections roll around, people seem to hear what they want to hear. My role is to preach the text and allow the Holy Spirit to foster a healthy spirituality in this place. At least that is the goal.

Isn't the Bible rife with politics? I agree that some biblical texts can be political just as the expression "Jesus is Lord" was in the first century. There are other texts that point to the relationship (or lack thereof) between the government and God's people. Often, the people were being oppressed by the government or religious authorities. Jesus had much to say about that and so should we.

As a rule, I have never endorsed candidates nor has the Session. We try to be good citizens of our country but endorsing someone seems to cross a line. I realize I may be in the minority here. Many churches now embrace candidates. I am also aware that most churches have Democrats, Republicans and Independents alike. I think Jesus transcends party affiliations. That is the major reason I don't preach about elections. I want to focus on Christ and his power at work in our lives and in the world.

As citizens, I believe God cares about our role in the electoral process. I believe God cares about the issues that come up during elections. We should care as well. We should strive to make our representatives accountable and work for a better democracy.

The grace and peace of Christ be with you.

Respectful Conversations are structured, facilitated conversations designed not to change minds, but soften hearts. Congregations, educational institutions and community groups throughout Minnesota have chosen to be sources of living water, cooling the heat of intense disagreements in their communities through the Respectful Conversations Project. Since 2012, more than 3,000 Minnesotans have participated in over 100 Respectful Conversations on a variety of divisive topics, including:

- The amendment defining marriage
- Community policing
- "Race" relations
- Being in community together after the divisive election
- Local impact of the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians
- Guns in Minnesota
- Differences between urban and rural politicians' concerns
- Internal concerns like budget management they felt listened to

We also are regularly in partnership with current or new host congregations in regard to designing custom conversations tailored for topics of local relevance. Who's Who in the Pew

One of the first things my husband, John, and I did when we moved to St. Cloud was join First Presbyterian Church. I have served as deacon and elder and have participated in many committees. I also served a term on Presbytery of Minnesota Valleys Council. I sang in Chancel Choir, rang in the bell choir and directed Carol Choir and Young Ringers. After years of Bible study, I have encountered many beautiful and inspiring Bible verses. It would be hard to choose a favorite, but as a gardener I'm drawn to Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. "For everything there is a season." It speaks to the rhythm of life, beginnings and endings.

While John was in dental school, I taught fifth grade

in the Mounds View School District until the birth of our first child. I then became mom, a homemaker and a volunteer. Later I earned a degree in mass communications and became a journalist and a University of Minnesota Master Gardener. I wrote gardening features for the St. Cloud Times for 5 years. My works also appeared in periodicals. I edited the "Tower" and the Presbytery newsletter, "The Valley Bridge," back in the day when it was printed and mailed.

John and I met at Grinnell College the first week of freshman orientation and were married the week after I graduated from Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois. After our wedding in Illinois, we moved to Minnesota where John was in dental school. We have been married 68 years. We have four daughters JoBeth, Julie, Janet and Jennie who were known as the "Pike Girls," followed by four adult grandsons and five great granddaughters ranging in age from 8 to 16 years. Our youngest daughter died during the pandemic. She was a cute and fun person, and her loss has left a void in our family. We planted an evergreen tree near the new church entrance in her memory. It has been a joy to watch our daughters



become parents and then our grandsons also have children. It is always strange when I hear someone call "Grandma" and they are talking to one of our daughters.



We have been very fortunate to have traveled to many interesting places. We golfed in Scotland and skied in Colorado. We biked in England, France, Germany and Austria. Enjoying the sights, smells and sounds while biking enhanced our enjoyment of the foreign country sides.

I was able to be a part of some memorable events in the life of the church. In the early 1970s when the Sunday school was much larger, I wrote and directed a Christmas pageant that became a meaningful part of many holiday celebrtions. All the music was live. Students sang and recited poetry that told the story of Christ's birth. A little angel appeared to fly over the scene and a brass ensemble of junior and senior high school students played as the camels processed with the kings. This was the debut of the camels who still appear in our Christmas programs.

In 1989 David Morreim and I co-chaired the 125th anniversary of the church, the quasquicentennial. David was in charge of a historical display while I wrote another pageant which was presented at a banquet in Atwood Center. All of our living former pastors attended. It was a grand celebration.

As for pastimes, gone are the days when I skied, biked and golfed. My gardening now consists of a few pots on the patio. I knit caps for those in need and am working on a prayer shawl. I belong to a group of musicians that meet once a month to perform for each other, so I practice the piano almost every day. John and I go for walks and do yoga twice a week.

Worshiping in this church has been a big part of my life. Now in my twilight years I enjoy sitting in the third pew watching a new generation grow from toddlers to teens to adults. It is also good to see new members and younger people taking leadership positions. I am grateful that I can still contribute to the worship service praising the Lord with piano selections. Life is good.
