Lent

The season of Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and self-examination in preparation for the celebration of the resurrection of the Lord at Easter. It is a period of 40 days — like the flood of Genesis, Moses' sojourn at Mount Sinai, Elijah's journey to Mount Horeb, Jonah's call to Ninevah to repent and Jesus' time of testing in the wilderness. (The Sundays in Lent are not counted in this reckoning of the time between Ash Wednesday and Easter, as every Lord's Day is a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.)

In the early church, Lent was a time of preparation for the celebration of baptism at the Easter Vigil. In many communities of faith, it remains a time to equip and nurture candidates for baptism and confirmation and to reflect deeply on the theme of baptismal discipleship.

At the beginning of Lent, we are reminded that our possessions, our rulers, our empires, our projects, our families and even our lives do not last forever.

We begin Lent on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 14) with a worship service at 7 pm in the sanctuary. The service will include communion and the imposition of ashes.

Pastor's Reflections

Most of us have heard of Lent but sometimes I wonder if we know what it means. Traditionally, Lent is observed as "the 40 weekdays from Ash Wednesday to Easter." The term "Lent" comes from the Old English word lengten, "to lengthen." It was originally a time to prepare candidates for baptism and became a period of penitence for those who have been baptized.

Some churches have traditions that date back centuries, fasting on certain days and refraining from

something they may love or cherish a bit too much. Other churches don't even celebrate Lent. We are somewhere in the middle.

While some Protestants still struggle with what to make of Lent ("Isn't that a Catholic thing?"), increasingly Presbyterian congregations are seeking creative approaches for making the season meaningful – including giving people opportunities to explore spiritual practices and to bring depth and a sense of community

to the weeks leading to Easter. This year we will do some of the familiar things we ordinarily practice such as collecting

money for the One Great Hour of Sharing, celebrating Ash Wednesday (2.14) and Maundy Thursday (3.28). I will begin a new sermon series, along with a few other Presbyterian pastors, covering the "I am" statements of Jesus in the gospel of John.

Whatever we choose to do as a congregation, or as individuals in the body of Christ, my hope is that it helps us celebrate the resurrection in a way that honors Jesus and draws us closer to him.

What practices help you in the journey during Lent? What do you remember about previous Lenten practices? How has the tradition helped you in your observance of Lent? I hope these and other questions bring us closer to each other and ultimately to Christ.

The grace and peace of Christ be with you.

Home Delivered Communion

On Communion Sunday, have you ever noticed the small, rectangular red or blue containers resting on the corner of the Communion Table and wondered what they are and why they're there? Inside the containers are bread, grape juice and small cups, all used for providing communion for the homebound of our congregation. The containers are on the

Communion Table for the contents to be blessed during our Communion service.

Home Delivered Communion at First Presbyterian Church originated around the year 2000, toward the end of Pastor David Reiter's tenure. Many in our congregation were homebound and unable to attend church to receive communion. The novel idea of home delivered communion was suggested. At the time the practice was not done in other congregations in our Presbytery, so the idea and process had to go through an approval process. Once approved, a liturgy was decided upon, and training was provided for the volunteers. At the time, volunteers were limited to ordained Elders (both current and former).

Linda Addicott and Janet Cotton were the first volunteers to deliver communion to the homes of church members. Soon, so many people requested the service that three teams (consisting of two Elders per team) each visited two homes on Communion Sunday. The "homes" were of many varieties, including single family, assisted living and nursing homes.

A few things have changed since then. Now both current and former Elders and Deacons can deliver home communion, and it is considered a Mission of the Deacons. Currently 10 Elders and Deacons participate in this Mission. There are 3 or 4 teams that go out each month, and each team usually only goes to one home.

A side benefit of Home Delivered Communion is the fellowship that occurs during our visits. Communion recipients and servers engage in conversation and share news from the church and community, as well as any concerns that the recipients may have. Through this simple Mission we all grow together in the love of Christ.
