Pastor's Reflections

"We have too much money in America." It is a statement that a friend of mine sometimes mutter to each other. It is usually said in jest when someone spends an exorbitant amount of money on something we think is superfluous. Sometimes it might be the cost of a concert or sporting event. At other times it might be the cost of a home in another state or possibly what another family spent on their vacation. Isn't it interesting that we can always come up with something ridiculous when it involves someone else!

The challenge in the season of stewardship is to understand and pray about what gets in the way of a right relationship with God. In October, we learned in the gospel of Mark that wealth can get in the way. In fact, the text reminds us "how hard it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!" (Mark 10:17-31)

The Old Testament also has a lot to say about money and/or possessions. There are stern warnings directed against those who strive for wealth through greed, trickery, or treachery and those who act proud about riches and glory in their wealth (See Genesis 1-2, Exodus 16-17 to cite just a few).

In November every year we reflect on our own stewardship and possessions. We remind ourselves that God is the owner of it all (Psalm 24:1). Theologian John Calvin called the earth the "theater of God's glory." Second, we are reminded that God has provided more than enough. We then make a covenant to bring a portion of our riches to God. That will take place on Sunday, November 17.

I doubt many of us can resonate with the opening statement above. But, all of us should be able to give thanks to God for the blessings we have received. Please prayerfully consider what your pledge will be in 2025. May we all grow in our understanding of stewardship and what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Salvation Army Bell Ringing Once Again

As Thanksgiving and Christmas approach we can be a part of helping others by volunteering to ring the bells for donations for the Salvation Army.

> The Deacons are coordinating a day for our church on Saturday, November 23rd (the Saturday before Thanksgiving) at Lunds & Byerly's from 11:00am to 5pm. Please watch for sign up opportunities the first part of November.

The story of how the Salvation Army came to be is an interesting one. The Salvation Army was first founded in London in 1865 by a lay Methodist preacher named William Booth. The Red Kettle tradition started in San Francisco when Salvation Army Captain Joseph McFee promised free Christmas dinners to the poor around 1890. He placed a large red lobster pot at the Oakland ferry landing. A sign read "Keep the Pot Boiling."

Enough money was raised to provide 1,000 meals. The idea spread across the country. By 1896, 150,000 Christmas dinners were served. Four years later in 1900 a young girl began ringing a bell after noticing people were walking right by the red pots. Today the Salvation Army assists over 4.5 million people during the Holiday Season. The red kettles and ringing bells were successful and continue to be symbolic of the Salvation Army for fund raising today!

September Finances


September Finances look unusual this month for several reasons. We utilized some of our positive balance to fund the following items:

We paid an additional principal payment of \$15,000 on our capital loan.

We moved \$15,000 to our facility reserve to cover the work on the east parking lot sinkhole next spring.

After these "special payments", we have a positive balance of \$21,631.67
